#### Aborigines (part two)

Yilgarn supported very little wild life and consequently was sparsely populated. The aborigines were nomads who followed the water. When a rockhole dried up they would move on.

Although aborigine history is scarce it seems that Yilgarn was a region of cultural interaction for a number of aboriginal groups, the district wedged between a well-watered south/west and the desert interior.

Traditional and ceremonial life and customs were held here. The more secret ceremonies were conducted by the men at a corroboree ground along the Turkey Hill road, the first cleared paddock past the golf course.

At the initiation ceremonies the Elders expected everyone to abide by local laws. In later years the aborigine reserve became the meeting place for transient aborigines. Some would stay for a few days and some much longer.

Daisy Bates once interviewed aborigines for research. She recorded boys being taken to Yilgarn in preparation for initiation.

As white man's presence in Yilgarn became more numerous in the early years, there was a reversal of roles. Instead of the white man being dependent upon aboriginal knowledge and skills in an alien land, aborigines became dependant on the whites to survive. Their culture was being destroyed, water holes annexed, and the wildlife shot out.

In 1900 the Catholic Priest at Southern Cross wrote that aborigines have no control over white man's food. They must beg for it. The same with regard to clothing, they must wear the cast off clothing of every shape and size. 'They walk from the bush into town in procession, large lean dingo dogs going on before as a sort of vanguard. Then came the men carrying long sticks. Lagging behind came the women and children who formed the rear guard. Some women had babies slung on their backs. They form a motley crowd in their borrowed clothing. Scattering around they divide their forces to get over the ground more quickly, each going to his or her particular benefactor. My house was often approached by an old woman who squatted on the ground with a clay pipe in her mouth. Her chief request was for tobacco. Others wanted money to spend on drink. Food they could easily obtain for the asking, but intoxicants were not procurable without money. I was quite happy to give them water but they had tasted intoxicating liquor and had experienced its exhilarating influence, and would have it in spite of police regulations forbidding white men to supply it to them. Moving about as they do they have no inclination to construct even the rudest of shelters. They merely light a fire in the bush around which they squat, rolling themselves up in blankets supplied by the Aboriginal Protector, while their dogs keep watch. Their wandering disposition is strong'

'King Billy' was the accepted leader of the Southern Cross tribe. He organised corroborees and invited white people to come along and bring baccy and other goodies. Jim Champion was the boss man in later years. Jim's tracking ability was often sought by the police, and many a lost soul owed their life to Jim Champion and other police trackers.

As a measure of control and to keep whites away, an aboriginal reserve was allocated on the outskirts of Southern Cross, opposite the old railway station. Local aborigines were herded onto the reserve. Forrester's farm was on one side and Lake Polaris on the other. It was a narrow strip of red soil and

rock, covered in saltbush and a few spindly trees. Occupants built their own huts from flattened kerosene tins. Some lived in bush huts, while others made do with a lean-to of corrugated iron against a tree. Even by outback standards the conditions were appalling. For many years there were no toilets or even scheme water, while the Road Board and Aborigines Dept. fought it out as to who should pay. Aboriginal reserves had unintended consequences with sickness dogging the population. This did not occur while aborigines led a nomadic existence. They lived in squalor, neither understanding nor appreciating the need for hygiene. There was constant sickness and death as lack of hygiene and nourishment turned their camp into a cesspool of disease.

Police or Native Welfare took sick natives to Southern Cross hospital where they had their own ward out the back. A carbolic cap was firstly placed on their head to kill the nits, before being placed in a bath and washed by the nurses. After they were made well they returned to the Reserve, to again become sick. The aborigine's lot was not good.

A Royal Commission into aboriginal treatment in WA concluded that families of eight or nine lived huddled together in abject squalor without beds or facilities for washing, and dressed in cloths that a tramp would despise. A recommendation to close the reserves and re-establish the families into houses in town was ignored.

In those days the government did not hand out money to aborigines. The reserve population at Southern Cross who could not earn money by working were sustained by a weekly issue of tea, sugar, flour, and meat. Occasionally they got soap and a piece of rope tobacco.

The local police sergeant was also Aboriginal Protector and looked after the ration system. He would draw up a list of those entitled to free rations which were supplied to storekeepers and butchers in town.

The rope tobacco named 'conka' came bagged in ten metre coils and bits were broken off for the men. Women had no entitlement.

Those who wanted more than basic rations could supplement their diet by trapping rabbits or hunting kangaroos with dogs. Bounty paid on eagle beaks and fox scalps also brought in a few shillings, as did 'picking dead wool' from sheep carcasses.

Fit aborigines were expected to work if a job was available. They made good stockmen and shearers and fencers. Some could turn their hand to mechanics. Aboriginal women were also part of the labour force as domestic help. I remember highly respected Lizzie working at the hospital for many years. Another lady employed by Mrs Forrester bemoaned the fact that that she could not read. She hid when others were taken away as 'stolen generation' children and were taught to read and write.

In some cases aborigines were preferred over whites for casual work as they were not covered by legal requirements and outside the wages law. A permit was required from the local sergeant of police. The employer was then bound to supply the aborigine with sufficient rations and blankets and clothing. Aborigines working on farms and stations were expected to supply their own tent, usually made of wheat bags sewed together, or sleep out in the open.

Aborigine labour was in demand during the war years when the local workforce was depleted. This often resulted in complaints that able bodied men should have their rations cut when work was refused. Their wandering spirit often got in the way of a job.

Back in the mid-1950's I can recall the Mukinbudin group hanging around the railway station on Wednesday mornings to catch the train back home after a visit. They would hide in the wagons and

their heads would pop up as the train moved off. The women spoke a rapid fire dialect, far quicker than any other lingo I have heard.

Sometimes the number of transients on the reserve became a problem. The population could fluctuate from 30 to 200. Road Board Chairman Winfield claimed in 1937 the reserve population was increasing and there was concern that Southern Cross would become their headquarters. 'There is not another town in the State where natives are allowed to roam the streets as in Southern Cross.'

The 'sundown curfew' was not enforced strictly in Southern Cross as elsewhere in the State. Aborigines required a legitimate reason why they were still in town on an evening. Usually they were waiting for Goodin's pictures to start. Although aborigines were not segregated in the picture theatre as they were in Coolgardie, they generally kept to themselves and were not a problem.

Alcohol was always a worry as the aboriginal metabolism has difficulty handling liquor. Although it was forbidden to supply alcohol to aborigines, the regulation was not always observed by a few scheming white men who were after the money or aboriginal women.

Aboriginal sporting prowess was unquestioned. The star footballers were aboriginals and it was worth bailing them out of jail on Sunday if necessary to play for the local team. I recall quicksilver Perry Jackson, Willie Sambo, and the Champion boys in full flight. I went to school with the Champion boys. Years later I saw Perry in Kalgoorlie. He had been hit on the head with a bottle and no longer functioned properly.

Stealing and drinking and fighting were the main reasons for being locked up. The police sergeant put prisoners to work digging his garden, his veggie patch being the best in town.

The murder of Ruby Jackson at a drunken party in 1948 seems to be the catalyst for aborigines drifting away from Southern Cross. It was declared taboo. Some claim the shooting of their dogs by the police in 1960 was the final straw.

Either way the reserve is now silent as melaleuca scrub reclaims the land. The only sign of former occupation is rusting cans, sheets of flattened kerosene tins, corrugated iron, and fragments of pottery. The aborigine reserve has been closed and it is now policy for its people to live in town.

A few families of aboriginal descent have drifted back to Southern Cross but they do not have traditional links with the district. They are respected citizens who have assimilated into mainstream. This is all that remains of a group of people, who tried to hold onto ancient but fragile traditions against forces of great social change.

#### Finding Lung Cancer Early



Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer death and the fifth most common cancer diagnosed in Australia. It is responsible for almost one in five cancer deaths in Australia.

Throughout the Wheatbelt Region of WA, the *Find Cancer Early* program is urging people to pay attention to changes in their body and if they notice differences that may be symptoms of cancer, to tell their Doctor.

## What are the common signs and symptoms of lung cancer:

- Coughing up blood once off
- A cough that lasts for four weeks, or a worsening or changing of a long standing cough
- Repeated chest infections
- Becoming more short of breath, tired or lacking energy
- Unexplained weight loss
- Persistent (long lasting) chest or shoulder pain

If you have had any of these signs or symptoms, tell your doctor. It doesn't mean you've got lung cancer – usually they turn out to be something less serious. But it's important to tell your doctor and get them checked.

Remember, if it is lung cancer, the earlier it's found, the earlier it can be treated.

#### Lung Cancer Myths and Facts

Myth: Lung cancer is a death sentence. Fact: New treatments have increased survival rates, but finding cancer early is vital.

Myth: Only cigarette smokers get lung cancer. Fact: Around 2 in 10 cases of lung cancer occur in non-smokers. Myth: Lung cancer only affects men.

Fact: Lung cancer can affect anyone. Nearly 40% of lung cancer cases are in women.

Myth: The earliest sign of lung cancer is coughing up blood.

Fact: The first signs are often a persistent cough and shortness of breath.

Myth: If you smoke it's normal to have a cough.

Fact: Smokers often have a cough, but if you're a smoker and notice any persistent changes in the way you cough, you need to tell your doctor.

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




